HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

By Tim Baxter, Road Safety and Loss Prevention Specialist Construction Season Contract Project Plans, Specifications, and Contracts Signing and Barricades

State-wide Internal Road Department Assessments were conducted in all 82-member county road departments during the years of 2017 and 2018. This was done to determine where assistance was needed to improve road department safety and reduce liability. One of the many deficiencies found was the lack of good contracts for armor coat, crack seal, asphalt, and other construction and maintenance projects. Many counties either had no contract or signing requirements with the contractor or were missing in the most important aspects of contracts such as contractor liability insurance, responsibilities' for signing, performance, completion dates, etc.

As a result of the internal assessments, it was determined that 41 of the 82 NIRMA member counties, or 50%, had substandard contracts or no contracts whatsoever.

Simple comprehensive armor coat and crack sealing contracts have been developed for use by our member counties. Most larger projects in counties, such as asphalt resurfacing, bridges, etc. are hopefully designed by engineers who provide the proper contracts. These include liability insurance, contractor required construction signing, plans, specifications, etc. The internal road department assessments showed that a large number of counties do not have contracts related to armor coat and crack sealing.

Even if the county does not let a project to bid, due to estimate being lower than state bidding law requirements, a contract needs to be entered into between the county and contractor for liability insurance, performance bonds, construction signing, completion date, specifications, etc. and to hold the contractor to their quoted price. Without a proper written agreement outlining the respective party's duties and responsibilities the county and its taxpayers might be opening itself up to unnecessary liability that should properly be the responsibility of the contractor who is actually doing the work. Counties should NEVER pay a contractor before the work is completed. Sadly, this has happened and then the county is out those funds and the project is not completed.

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND CORRECTIONS

When employees receive thorough policy training, they are prepared to successfully complete their assigned job task. Using your adopted policies as part of your employee training will help ensure that there is consistency in your operations and reinforces expectations. Each month a critical task of your agencies operation should be addressed through training and policy review. Just think if you take one topic a month, you will have covered (12) critical tasks by the end of the year.

Everyone knows policies and procedures are an essential component of any agency. Policies are crucial, as they address foreseeability as well as provide a guideline for pertinent areas of operations and constitutes what is expected. Utilizing adopted procedures during decision making, ensures that the vision of the sheriff office is followed, but good decision can only be made if policy is communicated and known.

Attacking policy during litigation is easy, either you followed the established protocols, or you didn't, so how do you ensure staff are doing what is written? Policy failure begins with administration, simply adopting and implementing procedures is only one step of the process. Training and ensuring continuous education on written protocols should be provided. Policy fails because it is <u>assumed</u> employees read the procedures and will follow the way the sequence of guidelines were established. The true fact is, most read the policy or scan it once over and if no other training mechanism is put into place, policy will not be reviewed unless the employee is concerned their actions on a certain job task was called into question.

Policy and procedures are rendered useless without trainings, if administration neglects continuous education, policy failure will eventually happen. Risk management starts with administration and to ensure that exposures are limited, policy training is critical, not only for administration, but for the county and of course for the employee.


Remember policies and procedures will fail if employees and administration don't follow them.
