Mayor of Fremont, Nebraska announces first inland port authority board

The state of Nebraska's longest serving governor, Dave Heineman is among Mayor Joey Spellerberg's appointees to Fremont's first inland port authority board. The proposed 1,500-acre industrial site and logistics hub is a long-term effort to promote economic development in eastern Nebraska, including greater Fremont and the Omaha metropolitan area.

FREMONT, Neb. – Mayor Joey Spellerberg, in conjunction with Dodge County Board Chair Bob Missel, today announced the appointment of seven commissioners to guide the policy and development of the newly created Fremont Inland Port Authority. The new port authority district holds great promise to shape the future of the greater Fremont area.

"I am excited to announce these outstanding individuals as our first commissioners," said Spellerberg. "These community members bring a variety of experiences and leadership in government, business, and civic organizations. I look forward to working with them as they begin their important work to help provide more opportunities for our local communities and the state of Nebraska."

Dodge County Board Chair, Bob Missel noted the appointees' diverse backgrounds. "We appreciate their willingness to step up for the good of our community. When you look at their expertise, combined with Dave Heineman's working knowledge of economic development, we could not ask for a better start."

As the board gets established this spring, an engineering firm begins work on a detailed site plan. Megan Skiles, executive director of the Greater Fremont Development Council (GFDC), expects the study to be complete early next year. Skiles will serve as an advisor to the port authority board.

The Fremont City Council takes up the port authority appointments at its March 28 meeting, followed by the Dodge County Board of Supervisors, April 5.

Who runs the inland port authority?


Mayor Spellerberg appoints a seven-member volunteer board of commissioners for approval by the Fremont City Council and Dodge County Board of Supervisors.

What's the difference between the inland port authority and local government?

While the inland port authority looks like local government, it does not levy taxes or exercise eminent domain.

Do taxpayers fund the port authority?

No. Nebraska inland port authorities actually have financing tools that other communities don't have. That's what it takes to get large shovel-ready industrial developments off the ground.

Why is this a ten-year project?

A development of this size requires a thoughtful approach to make sure it's a win for our community. During this pre-development phase, we expect many months of careful planning before we're ready to break ground.

What happens to the ag land within the inland port authority district?

For now, we don't anticipate disruptions. The property remains ag land until the time is right. The next key step is a site plan to share a vision of what's possible.

Are we starting from scratch?

Not at all. Buy-in from GFDC business members since 2019 fuels growing interest. As a result of a \$30 million grant from the state Nebraska Rural Projects Act, you'll see engineers onsite this spring.

How can the community help?

Thanks to community support, the state of Nebraska chose the greater Fremont area for this opportunity. The best thing we can do is continue progress in affordable housing and workforce development.
